Recognizing Christ in every guest

A ministry that started with one sandwich 30 years ago now provides 44,000 midday meals a year — plus a growing array of connections to housing, employment, medical, and veterans assistance.

The Open Door Café, at the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist in downtown Milwaukee, traces its roots to the day a homeless man asked a Cathedral priest for money to buy food. The priest made him lunch. Day by day, the number of visitors in need of nourishment grew, and so did the ministry.



“We all need connection — volunteers and guests,” says Director of Outreach Ministries Shelly Roder. “Encountering people who are different from you and learning their stories, seeing them as people, is what changes hearts and minds and, ultimately, the world.”



Tirrell credits Café services with helping him to “be better, do better.” He came to the Café as a guest and now works as a hospitality and maintenance assistant. “I look forward to coming here because of the love,” he says. “I like working—painting the hallway, working in the kitchen. Wherever they need me, I’m there.”



Today, the Café serves an average 165 men, women and children a day, six days a week, with a sit-down meal or bag lunch. Additional services include hygiene kits, flu shots, bus tickets and information about shelters, clothing, food pantries, clinics, job placement and other resources.

“We all need connection — volunteers and guests,” says Director of Outreach Ministries Shelly Roder. “Encountering

people who are different from you and learning their stories, seeing them as people, is what changes hearts and minds and, ultimately, the world.”

Robert, a Café guest, says Shelly is “a really good connector. She made sure I knew about an innovative housing program.” Robert applied and now has a home as well as employment.

Tirrell credits Café services with helping him to “be better, do better.” He came to the Café as a guest and now works as a hospitality and maintenance assistant. “I look forward to coming here because of the love,” he says. “I like working—painting the hallway, working in the kitchen. Wherever they need me, I’m there.”

An internship program helps participants move into mainstream employment in hospitals, hotels and other venues. The recently launched Cathedral Squared Enterprises, which started with a women's craft circle making picnic and sleeping mats from plastic bags, is another way to create job opportunities.

Tirrell says the respectful atmosphere at the Café makes him eager to spread the word. "When I see someone sleeping at a bus stop, I wake them up and tell them about the hot food, hygiene kits,

clothing and resources," Tirrell says. "This is a good place to be."

Shelly says funds from The Catholic Community Foundation and other donors are essential to cover the Café's operating expenses, from utensils and cleaning supplies to salaries and maintenance. "This is the Church doing what we're called to do in a very practical and real way," she adds. "We provide connections, and food is our way of doing it." Robert looks at how his life has changed and agrees. "It only happened because I showed up for lunch." ●

Six days a week, hundreds of volunteers join hundreds of guests in a warm environment that creates important connections for everyone. People experiencing poverty, homelessness and hunger receive a hot lunch, with the opportunity for additional services to help them open doors. Volunteers witness the courage of those who come to the Café, gain new insights into people's lives and help build a stronger community where everyone has access to HOPE.

NOTES to financial statements

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses and the disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of financial statements. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Tax-Exempt Status

The Foundation is exempt from federal and state income taxes on related exempt function income under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and has been classified as an organization other than a private foundation.

Agency Endowment Funds

Certain Catholic parishes and other organizations have transferred funds to the Foundation for management. These funds are invested with the other funds of the Foundation, but title is retained by the transferring organization and the funds are reflected in the statements of financial position of the Foundation as investments and the corresponding amounts listed as current and long-term liabilities.

Net Assets

Net assets, revenues, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Foundation are classified and reported as follows:

Unrestricted Net Assets

Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations.

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that either expire by passage of time or can be fulfilled and removed by actions of the Foundation pursuant to those stipulations.

Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Foundation. Currently, the Foundation does not have any permanently restricted net assets.

The Catholic Community Foundation is audited annually.

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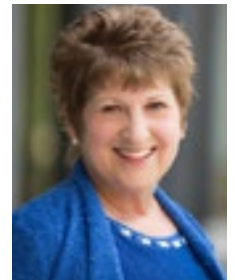
